RE:	San Diego County Voter Support for Funding Transportation Improvements

Fairbank, Maslin, Maullin, Metz & Associates (FM3) recently completed a survey of San Diego County voters to assess their support for a ballot measure to invest in regional transportation improvements.<sup>1</sup> The study found that <u>San Diego County voters see a clear need for additional funding for these investments, and three in five</u> <u>support a half-cent sales tax to fund them.</u> With the aid of a strong campaign in favor, a half-cent sales tax measure begins the campaign well-positioned for passage in November 2024.

Key findings include:


• San Diego voters broadly see a need for additional funding for public transportation, streets and roads. Figure 1 below shows that seven in ten see at least "some need" for additional funding for streets and roads, and 58% say the same for public transportation. These numbers are as high or higher than those from a similar poll conducted in 2021.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> **Methodology:** From May 3-9, 2023, FM3 completed 723 interviews by phone (cell and landline) and email with randomly-selected likely November 2024 voters in San Diego County. The margin of sampling error for the study is +/-4.0% at the 95% confidence level; margins of error for subsamples will be higher. Due to rounding, not all totals will sum to 100%.



## Figure 1: Need for Funding

Would you say San Diego County has a great need for additional funding, some need, a little need, or no real need for additional funding for (HALF SAMPLE: public transportation) (HALF SAMPLE: streets and roads)?






- Nearly three in five support a transportation funding measure based on draft ballot language alone. As shown in Figure 2 below, three in five San Diego voters say they would vote "yes" on a measure to improve traffic, infrastructure and safety in thew County a 20-point margin of support. This includes backing from:
- 79% of Democrats, 58% of independents, and even 28% of GOP voters;
- 55% of men and 62% of women;
- 59% of voters with a four-year college degree and 61% of those without one:
- 57% of white voters and 68% of voters of color; and
- Majorities of voters in each of the County's five supervisorial districts.

## Figure 2: Support for a Sales Tax Measure

San Diego County Improvement Measure for Traffic, Infrastructure, and Safety. To reduce traffic congestion; repair local roads, fill potholes; improve pedestrian safety, expand public transit; help address the housing shortage; repair, retrofit and upgrade safety of aging bridges, storm drains, rail lines on bluffs in danger of collapse; reduce air pollution; shall voters authorize a ½¢ sales tax raising \$350,000,000 annually until ended by voters, requiring citizen oversight, public disclosure of spending, independent annual audits?



• Voters' top transportation investment priorities include fixing streets, re-routing the north county rail line, reducing traffic congestion, improving transportation safety, and repairing storm drains. The table below and on the next page shows the potential projects that at least three in five voters rated as "extremely" or "very important" to include in a measure.

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Project	% Extremely or Very Important
Fixing streets and repairing potholes	80%
Re-routing the North County coastal rail line to avoid bluffs that are at serious risk of collapse	63%



Project	% Extremely or Very Important
Improving transportation safety for everyone, including people who walk, bike, drive, or ride transit	60%
Reducing traffic congestion	60%
Repairing aging storm drains	60%

• **Messaging around the measure may increase support.** As shown in Figure 4, messaging may increase support slightly, but the measure remains at three in five (61%);

In sum, <u>San Diego County voters broadly see a need for additional funding for transportation projects</u> including street and road repairs, pothole fixes, re-routing the coastal rail line, storm drain improvements, and <u>upgrades to safety for people using every mode of transportation</u>. With the aid of a strong campaign, a measure to invest in these priorities is well-positioned for passage in November 2024.
